



# Airplay

### **WALT THOMPSON**

Walt's been ducking me for months trying to avoid this interview, and he admits this freely. I think it wound up being less painful than he'd anticipated, at least he seemed OK when it was over.



Tom showed us how to applique. We really have a lot of talent in our area. It's also nice to bring in people from out of town who might be in the area. The idea is to expand and have a lot of kite-related activities."

All of this be-

gan at 3:15 on November 3, 1995, but was immediately interrupted for him to set up his kite. As he began flying his Rev II about 15 minutes later, we started chatting. He said he is #12 on the SDKC roster of members, so he's been with the club from near its inception. He became interested in kiting when he went to the bay on his lunch hour to get away from the office.

He'd see Tony and Virginia flying with Ron Despojado. They let him fly their kites, and soon he was on the field with his first kite, a Rev I. This was the first of many; he now flies deltas, highflyers, foils, and fighter kites. He said, "I really enjoy flying fighters. That's it, right?" Trying to sneak an early out with this interview, Walt thought he'd get away after two or three questions. Not so fast, guy, there's

lots more to tell. We reminisced about meetings at Tony's house and then how Walt became the club president when our membership was very low. He said, "I think it was Charlie (our archivist) who nominated me for president; Ron had about four jobs to do, and we brought the membership back up. We made it very active and viable. Every month we had something

going on. We had a lot of variety. The idea was to

have the kite club be for kiters."

Walt credits a group effort for getting the New Year's Day Kite Fly going. His big push was for us to help out at the Del Mar Polo Grounds Children's Hospital fund raiser. He pointed out, "That was where we got a lot of exposure in terms of helping out non-profit groups. We also started events like the one at the Women's Club in Ocean Beach. Randy

As club president, Walt served the SDKC

for two years and then was appointed AKA district representative for Southern California and Hawaii. The American Kite Association president, David Gomberg, asked him to finish the last year of a threeyear term. Then in October of '94 he was elected to the full three years.


Walt pointed out, "Three years is a long time." But that will give him more chances to "start getting involved with other groups, like city functions and art groups. We helped open the B Street Pier Art Gallery with a kite, which was a first. The Port Authority had never before allowed kites on the pier, and Randy Tom's single-line kite was flown from it. There was also an art and music festival on the Broadway Pier and we had a big kite extravaganza then. That event was picked up by a lot of the media. They showed the skyline of San Diego with all the kites from local kitemakers. You could see Gail Lindsay's, Randy Tom's, Jose Sainz's, all those beautiful kites up in the air."

Walt went on to point out, "What I try to do with both the San Diego Kite Club and the AKA is to put kiting in areas that were not traditionally thinking about kiting. We've volunteered to go to organizations' picnics and fly, and we've gone on the road too. We went to Northridge when the local community services wanted to do something nice for their area after the earthquake, so they asked our help in putting on a kite festival - something that would be calming after all the destruction from the quake."

He's gone to the high desert, Santa Monica, and also north of Azusa for the Afghan Fighter Kite Fes-



On the road with Charlie and Joanne M'Clary



Well, we didn't have any floods to cause any creeks to rise, so I guess the Good Lord just wasn't willing, as we didn't make it! We probably should have taken the hint when we opened the doors to the motor home the morning we were to take off and a few things were missing — like the boom box including Charlie's new custom-made tape to fly to, the binoculars, the color TV and a few other things — but nevertheless, we started out.

The weather was hot, but everything else was in good order. We called Randy Shannon in Flagstaff





Dear San Diego Kite Club


