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Kites Fill The Sky At Oceanside's First Annual One Sky-One World Fly



HUNDREDS of white plastic sled kites with fluorescent pink and orange tails danced across the sky last October 12 at the first annual Oceanside Kite Fest held in conjunction with the world-wide observance of One Sky-One World, originated by Jane Parker-Ambrose (see accompanying article on page 4). The kites' dancing partners were over 500 happy children who got to make their own kites with the help of San Diego Kite Club members and other volunteers.

The myriad of white kites was a sight to behold against the clear blue sky as light winds began to materialize in late morning. By early afternoon winds became steadier and larger kites took to the air. Festival attendees were given a rare treat as Tyrus Wong showed up to fly his flock of owls. Also seen were the magnificent clipper ships and airplanes from Stratton and the always crowd-pleasing creatures made by John Rogers.

KITE PEOPLE

JANE PARKER-AMBROSE

Founder of One Sky-One World

JANE PARKER-AMBROSE is the founder of One Sky-One World, the organization that is known for kite flies held the second Sunday in October each year as a gesture of good will and hope for world peace.

The historic 1985 summit meeting of Presidents Ronald Reagan of the United States and Mikhail Gorbachev of the USSR marked a significant step toward peace between the super-powers. The spirit of that meeting inspired American kite designer Jane Parker-Ambrose to create a kite commemorating this new promise of world harmony. The flags of the US and USSR are joined on the face of the kite. Halley's comet, which revisited the Earth in 1986 for the first time in 76 years, is shown as a portent of peace.

In mid October of 1985 Jane flew to the Soviet Union where she visited Moscow and Leningrad, and while there she presented her kite to Valentine Tereshkova, the first woman in space. Tereshkova was the president of the Soviet Women's Peace Committee and the kite was presented as a gift as a sign of friendship. Jane also presented a letter of friendship signed by some 300 kite fliers from the U.S., Canada, Japan and the United Kingdom. Many of the signatures from American kite fliers were members of the AKA. This gesture of international good will gave birth to the idea for One Sky-One World as an annual global kite fly. One Sky-One World is based in Denver, Colorado, and is a non-profit organization. Its mission is to focus the entire planet's attention on the need to maintain peace and protect the environment.

The first One Sky-One World kite fly took place in 1986 with more than 10,000 kites and 40,000 participants at 90 locations in 14 countries. Since that time One Sky-One World events have been held not only in every state in the U.S., including Alaska and Hawaii, but in Moscow, Bombay, Berlin, Sydney, Beijing and many other cities in Japan, France, Colombia, Guam, Chili, England, Hungary, Italy, the Netherlands, Scotland, as many other countries have been added each year. The organization tries to get a record of how many fliers participate in each location. With the 540 kites SDKC members helped youngsters in Oceanside build and fly plus approximately 60 other kites being flown, it is estimated that approximately 600 kites were flown at our One Sky-One World fly in Oceanside this year.

Jane Parker-Ambrose has traveled around the world to promote her message. In August she was inducted into the Hall of Fame in Long Beach, Washington, which is part of the World Kite Museum and Hall of Fame. This honor was bestowed on her in recognition of her never-ending efforts and the positive effect she has had on the kiting world, primarily because of her founding One Sky-One World. She has promoted interest in kiting and world peace and that has become a way of life for her.

The San Diego Kite Club was happy to have Jane Parker-Ambrose share her special day with us by attending the fun fly in Oceanside. She assisted the children and visited with club members as well as spoke kindly of the club while she was being interviewed by someone from a local radio station. She also joined the San Diego Kite Club, so we are proud to welcome her as one of our newest members. She stated she plans to come to the KTA convention in January and hopefully she will have time to come out and fly.

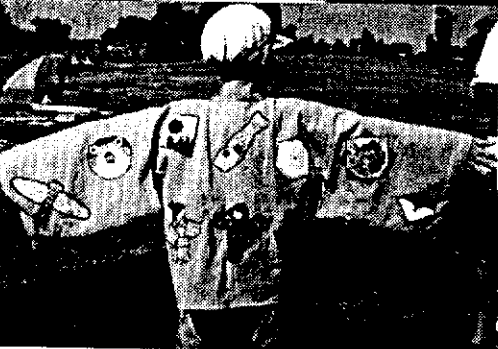
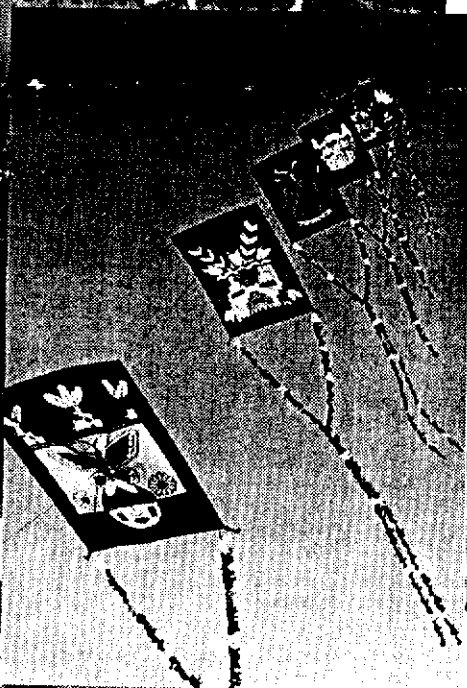

It made a nasty noise as the Velcro ripped away and Tut tumbled to the ground, luckily missing all the spectators. I considered the tail lost, but some of the quadline fliers in the group considered it a challenge. After about an hour of efforts by Charlie M'Clary, Ron Despojado (who literally put his life on the line) and Marshall Morgan, the tail was successfully retrieved.

Also taking advantage of the high winds was Steve Bateman who donned a wetsuit and took to the water, getting pulled through the surf by a large foil.

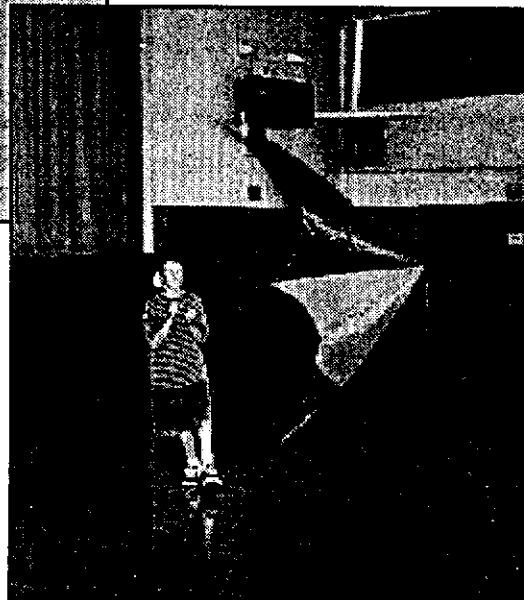

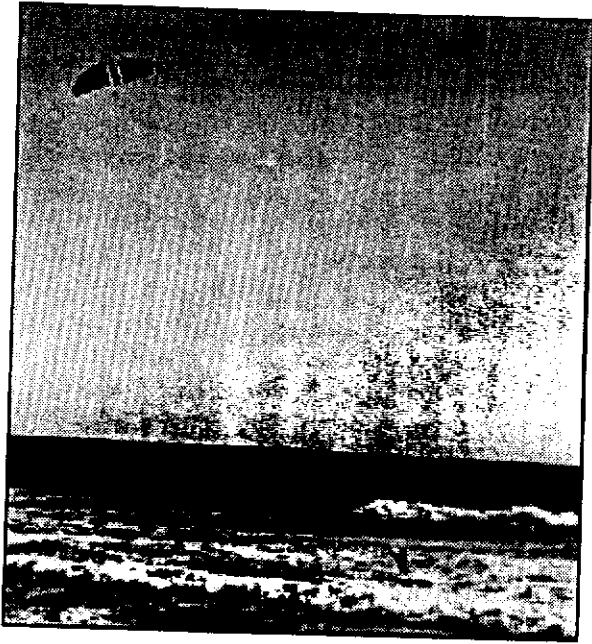

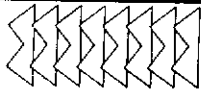

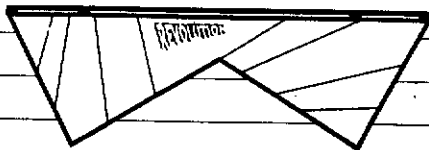


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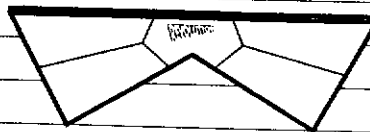
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WHERE BIG THINGS FLEW IN '97

At any rate, this year my flying creations got me invited to several festivals and one of my kites won a pair of medals at the Smithsonian festival in Washington, DC.

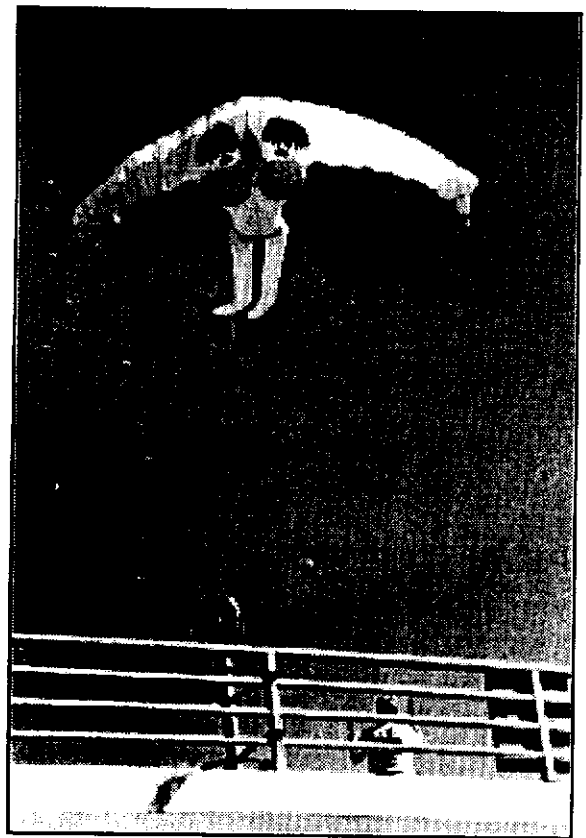

On Memorial Day weekend I got invited to the San Ramon Wind and Art Festival, which is just east of San Francisco. That was a great experience and Rosie and Julia got to go with me and shopped till they dropped at all the art tents. I bought a hat that sure is great for keeping the sun off. For all those who have asked me about it, their number is 1-888-U-PICNIC and the hats are \$20 or so. Anyways, Ron and Nichole came too and we put on a good show. A short drive up the road and we all went to Huntington Beach to help Steve Kent put on a show in support of a music and entertainment festival. I guess I am getting old because the sand sure tires me out, but the sight of all those flowforms, including Big Mo, was worth the trip.

Daq Rubesh invited me up to Port Hueneme for their Harbor Days celebration and that was great. The number of flyers was small but the crowds were big and the Polynesian theme and entertainment was great. The kites were on the local cable company's event

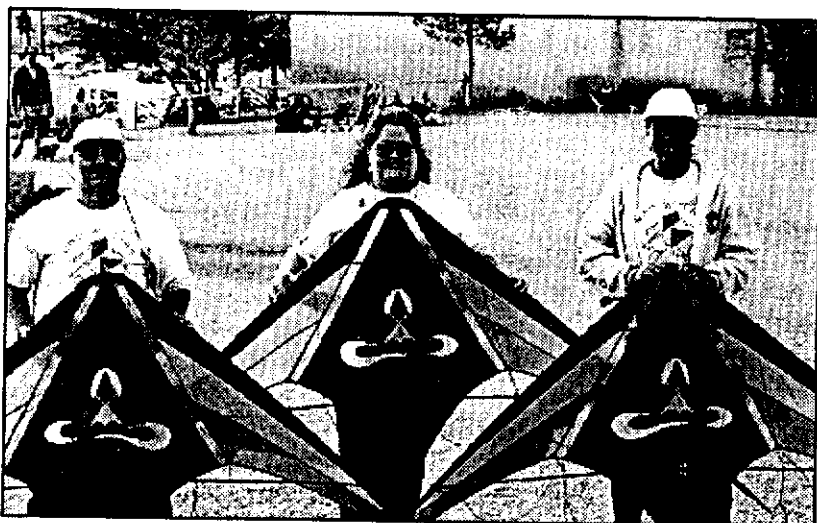

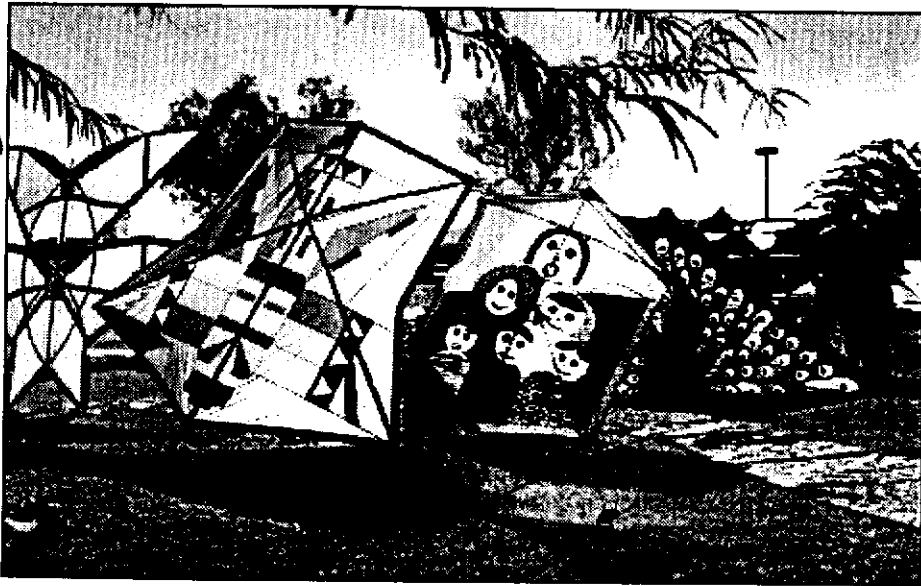

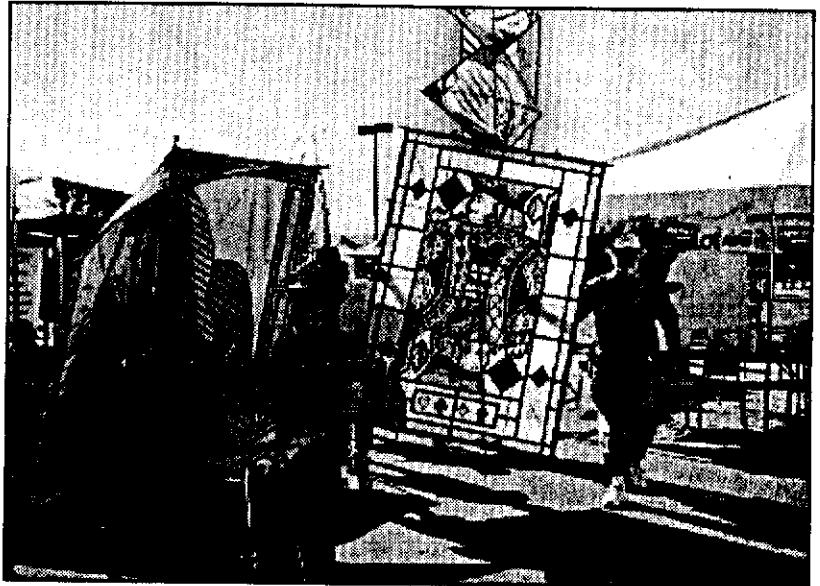

The Wind Witches put on one of their best performances ever and were quick to congratulate each other after it was over.

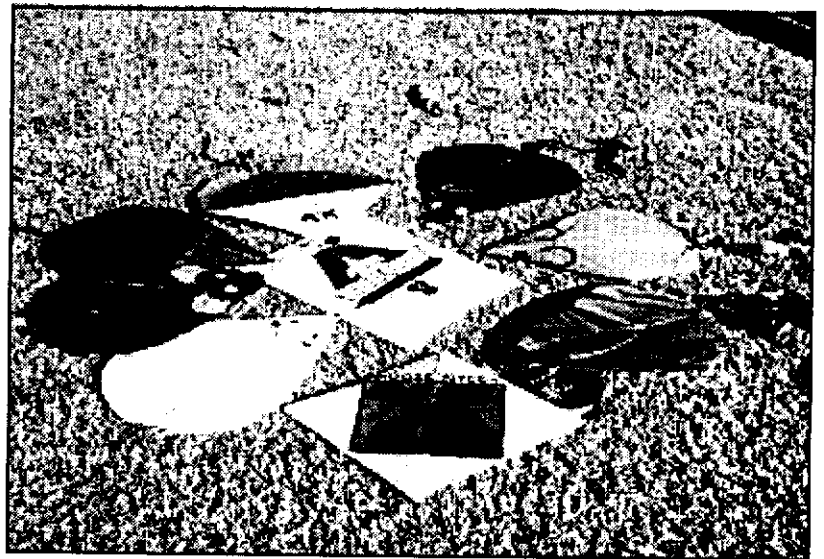




What do you do when the wind doesn't cooperate? Ground display! And the latest no-wind activity: the Kite Parade.

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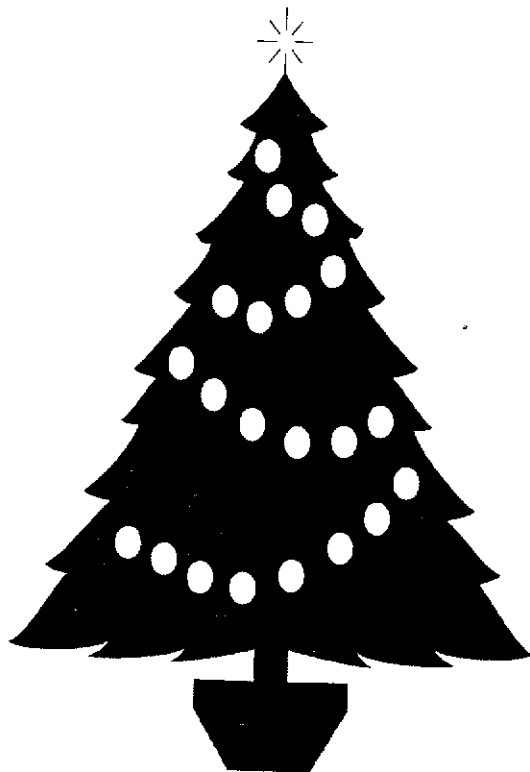


The Wind Witches showing off their new hats at the Autumn Sea Fair at Cabrillo Marine Aquarium in San Pedro.
