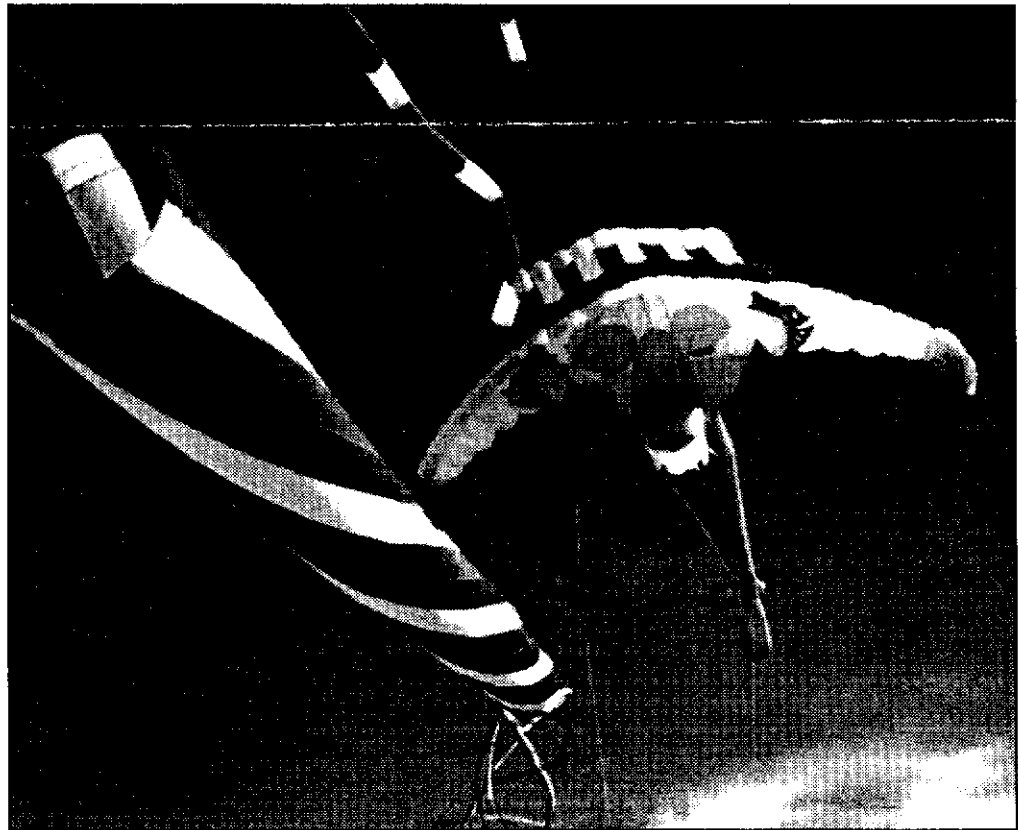

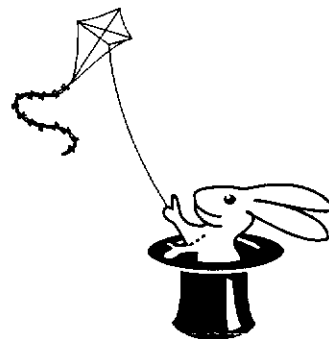

much income from memberships alone, so we must rely on fundraising activities like raffles, auctions, food & product sales, etc., to make up the difference.

To help with the financial responsibilities, we just ask that you support our club by paying your membership dues on time and participating in the other fundraisers, whether by just buying tickets or donating items for raffles. It would be great if we could have a food sale at the regular meetings, but it would take someone willing to take on the responsibility that Virginia, Connie, Diana and others have done in the past. And thank you, Oggie, for surprising us with the January barbecue treat!

As for this issue — a bit thin and a lot late — the main problem was lack of input. I am very grateful to Joanne M'Clary, Gina Hsiung, Torri Cable, John Rogers and others who have faithfully contributed articles in the past, but there is a definite need for people willing to pass on their experiences, talents, opinions, whatever. You don't have to be a great writer (that's why we have an editor), you just need a desire to share. After all, isn't that why you are in a club? 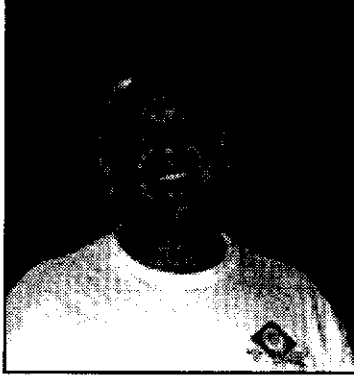

THE San Diego Kite Club's equipment is in good hands — Mitch Anderson's hands as a matter of fact. To save us paying \$30 a month in storage fees, Mitch has constructed a shed in his mother's back yard to keep the sound system and other items that belong to the club. Mitch is also the man who makes sure our banners, tables, sound, and other necessary "stuff" is set up so our food has a place to sit, the banners tell us where to meet, and of course the sound so we can hear the music, messages and other important air waves.

Mitch saw me coming across the field and put his interviewee hat on. I said, "So Mitch, what are you flyin'?" and he replied, "The Wild Child." Kinda suits him, don't you think? Actually, Mitch is one of the nicest guys you'll ever meet — and he does a mean axle too, or three, and often four.

When I accused him of just messin' around, Mitch came back with, "That's the only thing to do with a kite. Mess around, that's what Charlie told me. He's the one who got me into kite flying about January of '95. A friend and I brought his kids down to the park to play and I saw Charlie flying his dragon kite. I thought that was awesome. The next day I went to All About Kites and bought a Rev II and flew that puppy every day for six months — without missing one day." The Charlie Mitch referred to is of course San Diego's own infamous Charlie M'Clary. Need I say more?

Mitch says he picked up two-lined kites after he and Charlie flew fighters. Now he seems to be the axle master of South of the Hilton, flying his Wild Child in the right wind. His favorite light-wind kite is the Sabre.

Mitch helped our treasurer, Carol Miles, learn how to fly just after the new year and he said, "If it wasn't for that, teaching someone how to fly kites, I wouldn't be flying." He said he'd competed once but helping somebody to fly was really special.

Mitch's reaction to competing at the first Aire Affair event leaves me to believe that we won't see him flying against anyone else, only helping them. He says he's tired of seeing the same old routines. "I want some tricks. That's my big thing; I like the tricks. I think competitions will eventually have more tricks in them and

they'll be judged on that. I know I haven't been around kiting all that long, but that's what I bet. I think there should be a 'trick class' — something other than ballet."

Mitch's girlfriend Katie watches him fly, but it's her 12-year-old daughter who seems to enjoy learning from Mitch. Maybe she'd be willing to be part of a routine that showed how "tricky" Mitch can be with a two-line kite the way many folks control quad-lines.

He says the best times he has on the field are when he's flying and he gets to tease folks with his kite — making it shake when a little kid is about to touch it, doing axles right in front of them — and then they come over and ask questions. That's what it's all about. He just likes to make sure they're enjoying themselves watching and maybe getting a chance to fly.

When he's not on the kite field, Mitch is kept busy at Southwest Electric installing electrical systems at commercial enterprises. He says he'll be kept pretty busy for the next month or so. That's what happens when you work for yourself — you don't get out on the field as much as you'd like.

I guess we owe a big vote of thanks to Charlie for urging Mitch to get involved, So thanks, Charlie! Mitch is a great equipment manager, wonderful friend, and all 'round terrific kite flyer.

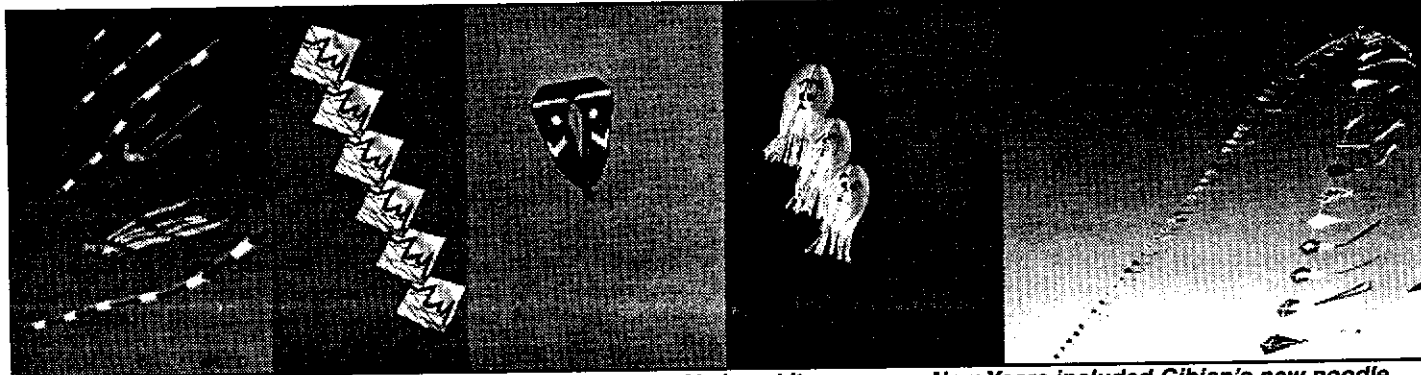

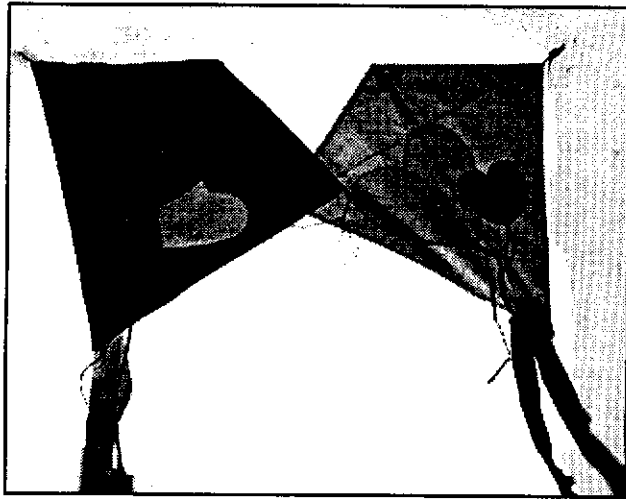

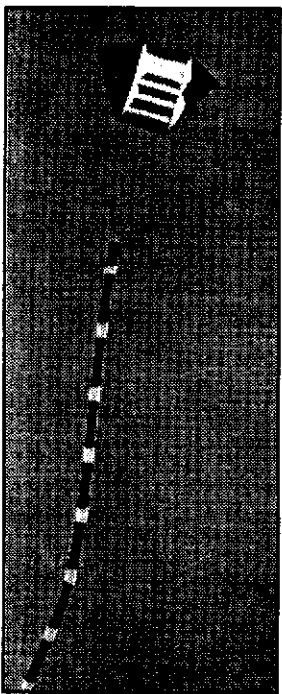
I can't believe the happiness kiting has brought into my world. Can you imagine, before I didn't like wind? Breezes, etc., yeah, but never prayed for wind.
