

Neil Tuthill of Whittier announced to us that one of Japan's leading kite makers was coming to Southern California and would attend our event. In addition, SDKC would hold a reception on New Year's Eve





SDKC Members go Hollywood, sort of...

On location in El Mirage with kites and very little (if any) wind mini-cattle call was held on December 14 1994 at the Hilton hotel. The purpose was for certain "types" to tryout for a commercial with kites in the background.

A Los Angeles production company sent a representative to interview and videotape candidates. Eight members of the San Diego Kite Club and another in proxy met with Charlie, who looked and spoke like David Bowie, only with longer hair. One by one each person spoke in front of the camera about themselves and their kites. Of the nine hopefuls, only two (Randy Tom via proxy and Mike Dennis) were given the "...we'll call you" line.

So off they went. All that was known was that it was a two day shoot in the El Mirage lakebed, and kites were needed. The ensemble cast arrived late on Tuesday December 21st at the Holiday Inn in Victorville. This was the host hotel and most of the crew and cast were staying here.

The next morning breakfast was provided at the hotel. After breakfast all got into their vehicles and headed down the road. El Mirage is basically flat and hardpacked. A caravan of various vehicles was on location by 6 am. The van was unpacked and kites were assembled. Small problem-this was the wrong area. Pack up and move about 2 more miles. The

correct location looked no different than the first. Again the van was unpacked and kites assembled. The first order of business was hair, makeup, and wardrobe. All those appearing on camera are referred to as "Talent", and there were at least 16-20 total in the talent pool. None of the talent knew anything other than they were wearing very colorful clothesat the expense of being fashion victims. By design, luck, or convenience, the SDKC cast was given nicknames from either the production crew, a waiter, or from each other.

We need you to wait immediately

The actual filming location was about a three minute walk away form the wardrobe trailer. "Hurry up and wait" seems to be the philosophy in their business. The shot needed to be set up and many of the talent was put in position. About 2 or 3 hours later, actual taping was being done. The places where some of the talent was positioned hours earlier was soon forgotten. "Talent" may have been their tag, but many had no experience as kite fliers. Soon filming began. SDKC's "Kung-Fu Hip Hop Dude" was told to fly above the banners, just above the camera dolly tracks. One of the camera crew yelled "Get that outa" here, we don't want any accidents!". One minute late, Hip Hop was told by another to again fly over the dolly tracks, and again was told to move away from the cameras by another. "Red" had assembled many of his single liners for the other talent to fly. "The Gentleman in Brown" flew his quadline amidst the colorful talent. "Hat Man" flew his dual line, as did the two ladies- "Purple" and "Orange". "Bad Hair" was coordinating the SDKC talent and kept an eye on all equipment. Still, no one knew the whole story, what was being done, or their goal. Any kind of clue from the crew would have been helpful but could it be they didn't know what they wanted? Or maybe they were making it up as they went along?

Kite fliers are naturally dependant on the wind, a location shoot is dependant on available light, specifically the sun. Whenever the sun poked through, a wild panic ensued from the production company to work. The dialogue within the crew went something like: "SPEED?! Speed!! MOTOR?! Motor!! ROLLING?! Rolling!! Action!!! GO! GO! Now! Now!......CUT!" After each take, all talent stayed in position and the filming crew sat back and waited for the sun again. Two minutes, five minutes, ten minutes, however long it took the talent stayed on the set and waited for the sun, nevermind the wind was fading.

After numerous takes in this cofiguration, the set wapulled up and repositioned for another series of takes. "SPEED! MOTOR! ROLLING! ACTION!......CUT!!" Again the shoot was at the mercy of the sun and again whenever the filming

began it seemed like someone yelled "Fire!" and no one knew where the exit was. This time they wanted some movement from the talent; to move to other positions, crossing in front of the camera as it rolled along its tracks. This caused problems such as crossed lines and colliding kites. As each take was being filmed, they would almost always reposition the talent. Sometimes it would as simple as "Purpleget out of frame! Move! Now! Now!" Purple, The

somebody yelled "Fire!" and no one knew where the exit kites. Red flew a was

Gentleman Brown, and Bad Hair were off the set helping with the stack of Hyperkites but he himself was out of frame. Only

Hip Hop, Orange, and Hat Man were in frame. Bad Hair flew one of Red's kites but was out of frame. At one point a tangled line was being worked on but it was time to shoot so the director was screaming to hurry up. Finally he yelled, "Just give him a string and fake it!" During the filming one of the crew asked if we could stand in our present position and have the kites fly the other direction-upwind. I'm sure the right special effects crew could do that with computer generated graphic images, but unless the wind changed direction, downwind is the only way kitescan be flown.

A black Rolls Royce pulled up and out comes an child of maybe 8 years old from the back seat. He

came up to The Gentleman In Brown and asked to fly one of the kites. "These aren't the kind of kites you can just pick up and fly" was his reply. The little boy then countered with "You see that man, (the director) he's my dad." The kid repeated his question to Orange and Bad Hair, and he received negative answers both times. Both times he again had to remind them about who his dad was. The talent was in position on the set for hours. Hat Man remarked, "This must have been the longest sustained single, dual, and quad line mega fly ever." Eventually the crew and the set slowly dismantled, but no one

bothered to tell the talent. Instruction was given to be on the set at 5:00 am the next morning. The second day was to include shots from a helicopter.

Over dinner, the SDKC crew compared notes over the day's events. A whole new world was encountered. The crew was a melting pot of people speaking several languages, sporting an array of taste in wardrobe, and "orientations" running the gamut. What would the next day bring? Why was there a 5 a.m. location time? What was with those costumes? Will there be wind? Will there be a meeting to discuss what needs to be accomplished? (Yeah, right)

Thursday morning arrived and the cast & crew gathered at the hotel lobby for a continental breakfast. Shortly thereafter the caravan of vehicles traveled to the lakebed. One problem, it was 5 a.m. and the sun wasn't out yet. There were no obvious markers designating where the previous days shoot was. Picture this: a dozen cars and a wardrobe trailer wandering through the desert with absolutely no clue where their destination was. Some clustered around the trailer as if it were the mothership, others played scout and tried to find then previous location, not knowing what to look for in the darkness. Imagine looking for a needle in a haystack inside a dark barn and only a little pen-light for illumination.

Finally the previous location was found and wardrobe and makeup began work. One of the wardrobe crew cranked-up his car stereo, turned on his headlights, and proceeded to give the cast & crew a runway fashion show a la *Vogue* in the pre-dawn light. There was even a wind machine there to give him that


windblown look. "You go girl!- You go!" was screamed from the crowd. This definitely woke up most of those there.

Talent was ready. The set was reconstructed. Wait. No wind, but it was expected to start up in the early afternoon. The sky was overcast, it too was expected to clear up. Wait. Breezes came up and down, enough so that Orange pulled out her buggy, a stack of Speedwings and cruised the set. Wait for the sun to poke through. About noon the entire personnel was assembled to announce the shoot was off and they were to be contacted for a shoot next week. Or the week after. They would give a day's notice. Everyone was paid for their time. Apparently this is normal for their business. Everyone out of wardrobe and have a Merry Christmas.

The final day of the shoot took place 10 days later. This time only three from the SDKC were invited back, but Orange decided to pass up the shoot, partly because of work, and partly because of financial issues. Wardrobe and makeup was scheduled at 5:00 a.m., in the hotel this time. When a representative from the production company was informed that Orange didn't arrive the night before along with Hip Hop and Red, she asked if Orange was going to arrive later in the day. "No" was the reply. Right away the representative dialed up Orange's phone number and proceeded to sternly request her prescence. Twice. At 5:15 a.m.

The problem with the wind machine was the wind it produced swirled, giving unexpected turbulence. The kites would fly, then after a certain height, would twist, flutter, and fall only to again be pushed by the wind machine. This was only a test. Wind was predicted to be in the 10-12 mph range so the wind machine may not be required.

The current set was to be close-ups of a few of the talent flying with banners in the background. Their kites would be out of frame. Since there was still no wind so the wind machine was started. Again its turbulence did not bode well with the kites so others were out of shot holding the ends of their kitelines for the appearance of them flying kites.

It was time for the helicopter shot. The director specifically asked for two 12- stack Hyperkites to be flown. It was late in the afternoon and sunlight was noticebly disappearing. The 10-12 m.p.h. wind that was expected did not arrive. The set was reconfigured again and this time the talent was to run with their kites behind them into the cluster of banners. The Hyperkites were on either side to be flown as soon as the others arrived. Since the wind machine threw out a narrow window of wind the crew needed more. About a half-dozen ultalight aircraft were enlisted to line up and start up their engines, hoping their propellers would add to the wind. Same problemnarrow wind and turbulence.

Death be to thine stacks

The first take had the stacks floundering into the ground, barely getting 5' above the ground. It was then time to untangle the stacks and their 40' tails. This took at least 10 minutes each time. As one stack was cleared, the other would fall and again tangle. Two or three more attempts were made with the stacks and again the clearing of train lines and tails took about 10 minutes. Finally word came from above (the helicopter) "Kill the stacks!" Tension mounted as patience and sunlight grew short. After about a dozen takes, the order was given to fly the BIG kite. During the first take Red ran with his three winged creation through the banners, with helicopter flying around it. The director liked it so much it was repeated several times, each time the helicopter taking a different angle. Finally it was a wrap.

The crew again dismantled the set and all kites were broken down and put away. But not after JUST ONE MORE TAKE with the big kite. And now the wind came up.

Each of the Talent went in to the trailer for their payment and turn in their release forms. The desert

had become completely dark except for the light from the trailer. After payment received, Red and Hip Hop attempted to make their way back to the main road. But again in the complete darkness there were no landmarks indicating the way out. Directions were asked from a caravan of campers and the two finally found the main road but not without going through some off road excursion through the desert brush.

This was a whole new world for the SDKC crew. The manpower, equipment, and time that is perceived in the making of movies, television, videos, or anything else that requires numerous takes is by far no exaggeration. After this first time would the SDKC cast be willing to do it again?

Diana's MOO-velous Hash Browns Meat Pie

Q: What are recipes doing in a newsletter about kites??

A: Who cares?!
We all like to eat!

2 cups shredded American or cheddar cheese

1-103/4 ounce can condensed cream of chicken soup 1 cup sour cream

1/2 cup finely chopped onion

1/2 cup finely chopped green pepper

1/2 cup finely chopped red pepper

1/4 cup butter, melted

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 32 oz. package frozen loose-pack hash browns, thawed

1 cup crushed corn flakes

I tablespoon butter, melted

Grease a 9 x 13 inch baking dish. In a large bowl combine the cheese, soup, sour cream, onion green and red pepper. Mix well. Fold in the thawed hash brown potatoes. Turn the mixture into the prepared dish, Toss together the corn flakes and 1 tablespoon of melted butter. Sprinkle over the potato mixture. Bake in a 350 dgree oven for about 1 hour, until the casserole is golden brown and the potatoes are tender.

Fry hamburger & drain.


Add pepper, salt and onion



Virgil Dalton gives us this variation on a tradtionally simple kite design.

I have found that by sewing strips of fly screen or any kind of light screen acout 11/2" wide directly under and centered below the tubes will make your tubed sled more enjoya ble.

It makes the tubes inflate more firmly, the kite more stable and easier to launch in higher winds. It will allow you to move the bridle points back about one inch on a twenty inch kite, which causes it to fly at a higher angle.

To sew the screen onto the kite, applique them to the front of the kite skin, then cut the material from the back. This must be done before sewing the tubes to the back of the kite.



The rules:


- No whining.
