



That was fun, and Susan didn't want her dollar back (can't imagine why?) In seeing all the other performances, it was basically anyone's call. Ray was flawless, Mel was very imaginative, Steve was pure entertainment, and Bryan was innovative.

On Thursday I was slated to judge two events. The first was Master's Team Precision. One of the hardest things to do besides flying in low or no wind is being a judge in no or low winds. Throughout the week the winds were up and down. At the AKA Nationals, you are among the best of the best, and that includes the judges as well. As the teams did their compulsaries and freestyle program, we judges

In this event I was the head judge. We say about a dozen very good programs, and a few that still needed some polish. I saw one new contestant who I thought was "raw". He had very good techniques and execution, but tried to do too much. Later I spoke to him and said he had enormous potential, but needs to harness his energy, and to remember how much he paid for this advice. Nonetheless, there will be a good crop of new Master's Class quadfliers in the coming years (yikes!!)

Up until this point, I had not practiced MY Master's Quadline Ballet program in almost two months. That evening was the only time I had to practice. The sun was going down, the temperature was very chilly, and the wind was a sweet 14 mph. I had what felt like

Friday morning I woke to gray skies and light breezes. That's okay, in a few hours when I'm scheduled to fly the wind will pick up. After breakfast I take my

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



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kitebag out to the field and keep waiting for the wind to pick up. I keep waiting, and waiting, and waiting. Finally all of us in MIQB were called to our field. I was initially 5th on the flight order of about 12, but

never. The wind was a token 3 mph, but felt like less. I ran back, left, right, any which way I could to generate wind. Why now? Why couldn't the wind be like last night? It seemed like everybody else had no problem but me. I was doomed. As usual, as the flight order progressed, the wind got better. By the time the last one to fly was done, the wind had more than doubled to a still minimal 7 mph. That's the luck of the draw. This will not be my year to win the Grand National title.

Friday night was the great auction, both loud and silent. I submitted SDKC's "Super Bowl Kite"- the kite flown before the Super Bowl XXXII party and signed by 5 NFL players, one of which had an actual legible signature. Also contributed by SDKC was a

framed pinset. At last observation the pinset garnered \$65 in the silent auction. The Super Bowl Kite, which went into the loud auction, was the second to the last item presented. Mr. Stiles from the SDKC decided the kite needed to stay in San Diego and gave the high bid.

Saturday was great wind, and great kite flying. All sport kite and kite making competitions were over, the only thing left was the Fighter Kites, who, ironically, were flying in excessive winds- the wind I could have used the day before. The last of the mass ascensions was also held, and I flew my invisible kite as usual. The rokkaku battles were held and most on the field got into the spirit of it all. The kites were identified by their markings, there was the Moe kite (from the three stooges), the cow kite complete with cow markings, and a few conservative looking kites denoting either Kite Clubs or else regions.

That evening was the dinner and awards ceremonies. At my table was Ray Bethell, whom most know is very hard of hearing. During several of the speeches, Ray would say out of nowhere "Did he win?" Gerri Adler, also at the table would tell Ray that no, no one won anything. Ray then returned with "Well then, who won?" This brought a chuckle to those seated.

A few minutes would go by and again Ray would say "Is he done talking about me?" Obviously Ray was bored. Then he decided to predict the standings of the event he and I were in. This first-time multi-media presentation was assembled by Mike Gilliard of Captain Eddie's Flying Circus. Mike also has a website magazine called "Kite Life" which is located at www.kitelife.com. Mike has graciously permitted the use of these photos from his website. This was my fifth AKA convention, and what I feel has been the most enjoyable. I had very little idle time and found the more I was busy volunteering or else attending a meeting, the more fulfilling the entire experience was. I urge all of you to attend the nex AKA Convention which will be in Muncie Indiana.

And in hindsight, I did make one mistake in judgement during this convention.







Just beyond Belmont Beach but with in plain sight is docked the grandest ocean liner ever built: the Queen Mary. She is a legend steeped in history and tradition. During the 2nd World War she was a troopship known as "The Grey Ghost" she arrived at Long Beach in 1967 and was opened to the public in 1971. The Hotel Queen Mary, as she is now called, boasts 365 original staterooms spanning 3 decks, the last time I stood looking awe at this beautiful ship was on Southampton docks in England I was 22 years old. Who would have thought that 50 years later I would be touring this majestic piece of history from stem to stern, which when you think that in her hey-day only the rich and famous could do? I wish to thank my sponsor Neil Tuthill and ANCAL for_ arranging this tour as a special thank you for a jear well done, it was indeed a great way to finish off yet another great sponsored trip to sunny California.

He was the singer in the house band, and the night before Nicole and her dad- Earl Conley had met him at the lounge. His name was John Encinio and coincidentally 20 years ago he stayed at Earl's Motel 6 in Barstow. John had won a certificate from Earl via the military for a free weekend stay. They both remembered the incident

and who would have thought 20 years later they meet up again. Also, Marshall Morgan saw his aunt and uncle who coincidentally was the Building Inspector during the casino's construction. But we are here to fly kites!!

The first official day of the festival- Saturday- there was

zero wind. But there was the grandest ground display of kites in the west. Some of the notable names were Scott Skinner, Ron Gibian, Don Mock, Leonard Mixon, Jose Sainz, and Steve Davis. At one point Scott has a kite tossing contest. There was no wind, we have to improvise. Then, Scott invites a few of us to grab one of his kites and run around doing a team ballet. 
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
