

those of us who keep an eye on the sky for several years now. When you're headed toward the kite field and you see an assortment of very large, colorful kites in the air you know John is "up in the air."

Mr. Rogers of the kiting world could be flying his caricatre of Rosie, his wife, or his self-portrait kite that looks almost as good as the real thing. Almost everyone around John has been "honored" (though I

do use that term loosely) by having a kite fashioned in their image.

I caught John on his favorite flying hill at Tecolote Shores. He was, as usual, being "harassed" by children. They're fascinated by his huge creations and just want to be close to all this bigger-than-life stuff.

When asked how he got involved in making large kites, John said, "I just made one and it was bigger than all the others. Mainly I like the size because of the engineering challenge it presents. To be able to make a large kite stable, that flies well, and then to be able to take it apart so it can be transported easily — to me that's a real challenge. Now I'm into making kites with no spars. I think that's an even bigger challenge."

John pointed out that the first character kite he made was Walter the Kite Man, and that was followed by his girlfriend Lucy. Now, did he mean Walter's girlfriend or his??? These kites are now being flown in many parts of the world since John's friend Jim Low is their new caretaker. Jim has traveled to South America with the big kites, and he's also flown them up and down the east coast of the U.S. (The Uncle Sam kite that John made for Jim was voted the funniest kite at the Smithsonian this year. Now that's something to sing Yankee Doodle Dandy about!)

John said, "After that I made a caricature of my wife, Rosie, and then I made one of myself, I've also made Harry the Alien, and it now belongs to Hashimoto San. He traded me one of his kites for it. Now that's a real honor."

When pressed about his current activities, John admitted that one more family member is in for it, I mean will have a kite as a namesake. Sometimes it's hard to believe, but there is life outside of kiting. In John's real life he says, "I write computer programs and teach computer science classes at Chapman University and for the U.S. Navy. I guess you can say I'm a college professor as well as being a computer nerd."

John Rogers seems to personify what kiting is all about. He's fun and so are his kites. He shows up for as many events as possible to entertain and amuse with his behemoth kite people. For the past five years he's been a fixture at the O.B. Kite Festival and he's always willing to give demos and hele teach whenever he's asked. His parabears help dro, the Halloween candy each October, and his lovely wife, Rosie, provides some of the favorite dishes at our many potlucks.

Thanks, John, for all you do to brighten our world.



SO CAL OPEN

All things being equal, this year's Southern California Open could only be termed a plus. The day was sunny, the sky was blue, and best of all, there was wind.

The event really began the Tuesday before the fires of the competition started running through each of the competitors' veins. For the first time in recent memory the club was being recognized for what we bring to San Diego as the unofficial greeters to the visitors and residents traveling south on I-5. Channel 51 was invited by the club to do with us as they pleased — and they did. We were being given the opportunity to show our wares on live television at 7:45 a.m. on a Tuesday morning — with no wind — and you know what? We came through. On that morning at least 20 club members made it to Mission Bay Park and put the colors in the sky for the cameras. It was really a great showing for the club and got the event off on the right foot. I wish I could remember

everyone who came out and personally thank each and every one of you right here, but I was too harried to take down names.

The event really began at about 5:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 26, when that hunk of a man, Mitch Anderson, started getting the sound equipment out of storage, loaded it on his truck, and set off to Fiesta Island. By the time the competitors arrived

he had it up and running. At the beginning things looked grim and the starting time had to be delayed. You really can't have a competition without wind. But at about 10:00 the sky cleared and the wind started to pick up — and we were off!

The events began with the precision field going full bore and the main field full of quads. Ron "I'll never take 2nd place again" Despojado turned in a stellar performance in the Masters Quad, beating out some pretty talented competition. (His skills will be showcased this June in The Caribbean against nine of the world's best. We wish him well!) The Experienced Quad trophy was taken by Lionel Gibbons who beat out seven other competitors including newcomer Ethan Le.

The Dual-Line Ballet competitions were a bit smaller this year, but as hotly contested as ever. The Novice Ballet was won by another newcomer, Luther Brown, followed by Ben Messin in the clos-

est race of the day. At the Intermediate level that multi-talented Lionel Gibbons flew an incredible routine to take home his second 1st place trophy of the day. He can be very proud of his day's accomplishments. Scott Hicks took the blue ribbon in the Experienced Class followed by Larry Mixon of the SDKC and John Shara of Ventura. At the Masters level those Northern California flyers again took the honors. John Morrison was 1st with one of his nicer routines followed by Michael Weingand, last year's winner.

The precision events ran smoothly and were noteworthy in that Luther Brown and Scott Hicks doubled their golds. Each flew their figures to a 1st place in the Novice and Experienced classes. Joey Bacon, of the Bay Area, gave Lionel Gibbons his only other than 1st finish in the Intermediate class, and Bowdy Aggers turned the tables on Northern California by taking a 1st in the Masters Individual Precision.

The specialty events were again smaller than last year's with only the Freestyle garnering more than one entrant. The Masters Pairs Ballet was won by Papalotes and the Experienced Pairs by the Sons of Thunder. In the Freestyle, Gary Pearson flying a delta kite in each hand beat out Jesse Lawrence's dancing legs and Bowdy Aggers' quad delta. In one of the newer events, the Quad Pairs, Team 4-Play, Ron

Despojado and Nicole Meinhardt, took 1st place in the Masters, with the Double J's — Joey Bacon and Jesse Lawrence, probably the youngest Quad team in the world — taking 1st in Experienced Quad.

More media coverage arrived also, with Channel 10's news channel doing three live weather reports from the festival between 9 & 11 a.m., which were repeated several times during the day. Several of the competitors were filmed and interviewed. Channel 39 also came, and a cameraman from ESPN.

Next, thank you Walt "Why Don't They Let Me Fly?" Thompson for your phenomenal job of score keeping. Finally, a special thank you to Neil Tuthill and Larry Bush for making this event possible.

After the obligatory pro-



The beach is very deep with approximately 100 feet of hard-packed sand along the water's edge that was perfect for buggying and land sailing. At least twice that much additional beach depth was available to fly our kites. The sand was very fine and clean. Of course, we brought our share of the sand home in our kites and kite bag.

The weather was perfect; we felt as though we had brought our own San Diego weather and winds along with us. We were able to fly our full array of kites from low-wind genkis to the high-wind "noodles" when the wind did get a little hard and bumpy. Can you imagine over 200,000 people watching us kite fliers during the opening weekend!

We were a part of a 17-person American entourage that was arranged by David and Susan Gomberg. Most of the group had previously met or at least bumped into each other at other kiting events over the years, but you really get the chance to get to know each other so much better when you're staying at the same hotel and starting your day off by having group breakfasts. 
It was quite a thrill to meet France's own Andre Cassagnes and to see his gorgeous




