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

Hot Tricks Shoot-Out: The Battle For King of The Hill Ron Despojado



Almost everyone agrees one of the most enjoyable events at the AKA Convention this year was the Hot Tricks Shoot-Out. The HTSO was setup by Darrin Skinner and feature a no-holds barred, all-out head to head competition. The contest was setup up like a typical tournament ladder where the winner of each round would advance to the next. This time there were 32 slots and almost all were

filled right away, with a few registering as their other events finished up.

The idea is to have two fliers on the field, about 3 minutes worth of music, and intervals from each flier, alternating 30 seconds apiece. The whole thing is to impress the judges who decide who advances and who is eliminated. They typically look to be impressed, usually with flying of the kites. Musical selections were varied as much as the competitors did, thanks to DJ Jazzy Jeff Erzin from the San Francisco area.

As was mentioned several times during the competition there were "NO RULES".

Even more impressive were the warriors themselves and their background. There was young vs. old, dual line vs. quad line vs. fighter kite, novice against masters, guys vs. girls. The names were enough to fill a who's who of sportkiting: Lindermann, Snowden, Hoac, Davidson, Wolff, Graziano, Weider, Ritter, Van Der Slice, and the list went on.

The wind started out very light in the first round. Even before I had my first match there were several 360's and 3-D work, both of which I felt were "my" specialty. The weather was extremely hot and humid, so to go all-out was a physical challenge. I won my first round but was exhausted. I knew I had to do things to stand out so I started my first fly by facing the judges, opening a bottle



Master Kitebuilder from Kyoto visits San Diego

San Diego kiting enjoyed a wonderful opportunity recently, to meet and learn from world class, Master Japanese kite builder, Nobuhiko Yoshizumi. The Mingei museum in Balboa Park and Seattle's Drachen Foundation, sponsored Yoshi-san to spend a week at each displaying his techniques, and constructing two 4x6 foot edo-dako (rectangular kite).

San Diego Kite Club members Jim and Jane Skryja, and Charlie and Joanne M'Clary supported Yoshi-san during his visit. He stayed with Jim and Jane and enjoyed his day off with Charlie and Joanne flying at the kite field.

Yoshizumi-san has built some giant kites and yet holds the Guiness World Record for the world's smallest kite. Small kites, the size of postage stamps, and flown on a single strand of raw silk are his real passion. Some of the styles he made were similar to the tombi-dako (eagle) and yakko (kimono).

Yoshi-san is a very warm, outgoing man eager to show his craft to all. Jim and Charlie spent as much time as they could soaking up his tips and techniques. He has provided some "washi" paper, bamboo, and raw silk to Jim and Charlie for a San Diego Kite Club member's clinic.

Who: Everyone! Make sure you drag someone with you!


Why: You are a kite flier! What else ya' gonna do?

Friday evening before the last kite meeting, eighteen SDKC members met in Jim and Jane Skrya's shop to split bamboo, make a Meister (Youshi) hat, and a 3 inch kimono kite, and eat pizza. Nobuhiko Youshizumi, the world famous Japanese miniature kite builder, showed Charlie MClary and Jim some of the techniques he uses in making miniature kites, during his recent visit to San Diego.

Yoshi left some washi and gold leaf backing paper, raw silk, and various bamboo pieces to

give us an opportunity to make these traditional kites. He also left a couple of small pieces of 200 year old bamboo saved from buildings that were being torn down in Kyoto. Joanne donated some red cloth for the hats to help get us in the oriental mood.

Using an assortment of cutting and splitting tools and colored pens, the results were quite satisfying. I don't remember any of the kites that didn't fly. Not a wall hanging in the bunch. They were attached to bamboo sticks by raw silk that was close to being invisible.
