Fighter Kites at Fiesta Island!

The Southern California Open will host it's first ever fighter kite competition on Sept. 25th. This will be the Southern California Sport Kite League's first event of the Y2K AKA season and should prove to be a memorable one.

The rules and guidelines for this event were developed by the Northwest Fighter Kite Association (NFKA) and are for "line-touch" competitions. By the time this goes to print, those rules should be posted on their web site (http://www.eskimo.com/~johnsen/nfka/index.html) for you to review. If they are not, contact me at the email address below and I'll email you a copy.

The nice thing about the fighter kite competition is that the fliers are left to run it themselves. They are also trusted to determine the winner of each heat as the fliers are much better judges of when their lines are crossed than any judge with a different perspective might be.

Steve Bateman has agreed to run the competition for the league and I'm confident that he'll do a fine job. Steve is an accomplished fighter pilot and kite builder and his enthusiasm for the sport will, I'm sure, help make our first competition a good one.

The scores and top three winners will be announced at the awards ceremony at the conclusion of the event and trophies will be handed out. A nominal entry fee of \$5, will be charged for each participant and the scores and standings will be passed along to the NFKA for posting on their web site as well as to the AKA.

In addition to the SCSKL's first fighter kite event, the league will also be introducing it's first-ever Quad Precision competition. Thanks to input from Ron Despojado, the league has all the necessary information (figures, judging criteria, etc.) to make this an interesting and fun event and we're encouraging ALL Quad fliers to attend and participate.

But wait ... there's more. We'll also be holding our first-ever Pairs Precision event and our own version of continued on Page 9

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The Presidents Message

First let me thank all who participated in the election and the run-off. In my position statement, included with your run-off election ballot, I suggested changes would be necessary if SDKC is to survive and grow.

Sorry I missed the last board and club meetings- but it was time for my annual pilgrimage to WSIKF. Furthermore, I don't really enjoy "meetings" and don't know many kite fliers who do so we are going to minimize them under my administration. Instead we will have a Club Fly on third Saturday during which we will fly. When the wind or the sun goes down there will be plenty of time for a "meeting". The monthly board meeting will be held then at a location mutually agreed on. Weather permitting, I would suggest that that meeting be held at the founders' table (immediately North of the Tecolote flying site where the Club was founded) and be open to all fliers who wish to attend. While the Bored Meeting on preceding Fridays has always been open to Club members I believe this format will attract more members into active participation in the workings of their Club.

Understanding the necessity of certain paperwork, the Club bulletin board will be set up during the Club Fly which, along with the pictures and such we normally display, will have minutes and reports from the preceding month posted with copies available for those who wish to have them.

I will also be asking that a "kiddy table" be set up with all the materials required to make simple paper and/or trash bag kites. We have long discussed a banner offering free kite flying lessons. I have a piece of light Tyvek and some colored felt tips I will use to make a temporary banner and hope that some of our better kite sewers (revive the Banner Bums) will come forward with a class banner. This will be manned by myself and others who are committed to

spreading kiting to others (most fliers enjoy offering their help to the uninitiated on occasion).

A member of my kitchen cabinet has suggested that we look to the non-kiting community around us for sponsorship. It is conceivable that with adequate sponsorship available we can reduce the price of SDKC membership to a very nominal figure and thereby increase membership numbers consideral With the development of Fiesta Island immine. numbers are going to count. In order to properly approach the non-kiting community for funds the Club will need a resume and presentation program. This will include activities that the club has participated in such as the Oceanside Festivals and the kite presentations at schools put on by members such as Virgil and Slim and the O.B. kite festival that Torri Cable helped so much with. The archives have a lot that can be used here but I will need help in putting the resume and presentation into proper condition. Volunteers and suggestions gratefully accepted.

To possibly attract sponsorship, several of us have tentatively agreed to put on a kite show somewhere on a beach in front of a restaurant in the late afternoon when people are enjoying a sunset. We are thinking of as many big one-liners as we can get in the air but will not exclude anyone. Anyone wishing to help in this can contact me for details as they develop.



Ron Despojado sturmed the crowd with his new trick 'METAMORPHASIS'




(For those who have never had the pleasure of attending the San Ramon festival, here are a few lines of explanation.



Although he was not a San Diego Kite Club member, the tragic loss of David Bui on July 17 in a car accident in Mexico has saddened all who know him. I feel compelled to share with those of you who didn't have that pleasure the kind of person he was and just how great a loss this is to the kiting community. I met first met David when I attended a SCKSL First Flight Workshop in March of '98. As Chief Judge and seasoned and highly successful competitive flier, he presented so much information in such a casual way that I immediately felt the tension I anticipated before my first competitive event diminish. He was always available to us fliers, at events or by email afterwards, to answer questions or give advice about any aspect of kiting. Even though he resigned his position with the Kite League when he moved to Yuma to work for Skyshark, I always hoped that he'd come to our events as a spectator. Now that I know that won't happen, I'm deeply saddened. My only consolation is that I always made a point to tell him how much I appreciated him and his support of the league and to me personally. Take a minute today to let someone who means a lot to you know it. Tomorrow is not guaranteed to any of us. What follows are excerpts from the many postings to rec.kites that followed the sad news of our loss. David was awarded some of the top honors in Kiting. - 1995 Outstanding Kiteflyer of the Year by American Kite Magazine -1995 American Kite National Circuit Masters Champion MIP & MIB - 1995 All American Sportkite Championships Champion MIP & MIB -AKA Grand Nationals Champion MIP - AKA Grand Nationals Champion in Comprehensive Kitemaking - cellular -AKA Grand Nationals Champion for Innovative Kite Award.

Occasionally you meet a person who shines brightly. David was this person. My company employed him and even more so, he was my dear friend. I would like to say a few words to tell people how I feel. David was a perfectionist. Although he expected perfection, he was patient with everyone involved. He had a leadership quality that few have and the ability to communicate his level of intensity and perfection to others and bring everyone up to a higher level. David's intensity, perfectionism, and leadership was contagious. Everyone in production wanted to spend time with him to show him that their work was up to his standards. 

More than anything else though, he made everything look easy. Last November ('98) Avi Kite Festival, I watched David fly his Tika in zero wind behind the hotel ... on 60' lines. This was not a zero wind kite by any stretch of the imagination, but David made flying it look effortless and you got the impression he could do it all day long. That was what I ALWAYS noticed about David's flying. He made it look like he could do it in his sleep. David was the consummate flier and inspiration incarnate. I took over David's job as Chief Judge and Scorekeeper for the SoCal Sport Kite League in Feb ('99). He passed along to me a laptop, some notebooks and a few binders full of forms. I corresponded with him for a time until he mudged me through the process of setting up a Sport Kiting event, taught me a few of the things I needed to know but mostly pointed out that the whole process was like flying a kite. There are LOTS of ways to do it...but when you do it well, it looks easy. David's relaxed and easy going approach to kiting set him apart from everyone else. As unassuming as he was, he stood out like a beacon and inspired more fliers than most of us will ever know. I'll miss him as a person and as a fellow flier. David was the jewel of kiting. -- Allen

WIND CONDITIONS - WIND CHART Submitted by Joanne M'Clary

You'll find that most kites will fly under wind ranges from 4 to 20 mph, anything beyond that is extreme and very few kites fly at anything less than 4 mph.. A general kite wind selection for one liners is as follows::

Centipede 7 to 10 mph, Coyne 5 to 15, Delta 3 to 17, Eddy 4 to 20, Hargrave 10 to 30, Fighter 0 to 7, Parafoil 8 to 30, Scott Sled 3 to 20,

Tetrahedrakl4 to 15 and a Thai Cobra 7 to 12.

Most sport or stunt kites will usually list the ideal wind conditions on brochures accompanying the kites and as you become acquainted with the different kites you will be able to gauge which kite to fly under what wind conditions.

One of the best means of determining whether wind conditions are suitable for kite flying or not is to check with the Beaufort Scale, a wind table devised by Sir Francis Beaufort, an English rear admiral who sought to give sailors a convenient set of signs by which to estimate these conditions. This scale can be particularly helpful to kitefliers inn determining by practical means the velocity of the wind.
