FLASH!

For all AKA members we now have insurance coverage for 1 million dollars per incident if we have a problem during our general meetings. By following the AKA/STACK INTERNATIONAL STUNT KITE COMPETITION RULES you could receive AKA points for competition.

This puts us in a different arena for our planned events. For those interested in national standings and the AKA Nationals Invitations, any festival that we hold will give the winners points and additional standing.

So long as we follow AKA Rules we can have a rated Regional or whatever you and others want. This can be stunt kite, fighter kite or kitemaking competitions. If you have ideas about this corner a Board of Directors member and present your ideas.

FLASH!

I invite those who are not AKA members to join or the benefits won't apply to you. This is a great deal. You get another newsletter (every other month) and help yourself and the sport. You also will be covered for \$100,000.00 whenever you fly and wherever so long as you fly safely.

was as I remember it- hurricane forces. Will it be the Rev I or the Rev II again this year? Okay, I'll seriously practice on Saturday.

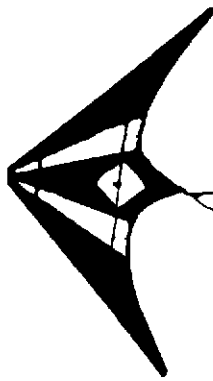
